Mai e te Tumuaki - From the Principal

It's the end of Week 6 of an 11-week term, so we are well into the term and full steam ahead with "Beyond Me: Exploring a World Outside Myself". This is the theme for the year that opens up so many avenues for learning across the Kura. Our kaimahi are working super hard to provide opportunities for our learners to think about what 'Beyond Me' means to them as a person, a learner and a kaitiaki of our school.

The midpoint in the term is when relationships and systems start to become tested as students test the boundaries. At the moment, we have seen an increasing number of students losing their cool while playing on the sports fields. We have spoken to all the students about this and are supporting them with different strategies to keep their cool. However, we are not tolerating these issues and putting consequences on those who continue to break the rules. While also rewarding the ones who are playing appropriately and respectfully.

On a brighter note, this term, whānau will receive a 'general comment' as a way of communicating with you about your child's progress. Next term you will receive a comment about reading, writing and maths. Based on some feedback from last year, we needed to make sure these were more specific about what your child can do and needs to do to improve. Please contact your child's teacher anytime for updates and to check in on progress. We want this to be a partnership in the learning process and journey.



The most exciting thing for me today is to share some significant news about our Kura. Today we begin a launch of our new school logo and some branding you will begin to see around our place. I have attached a document, "Weaving our Narrative", that explains the reason for the change and unpacks the significance of the different aspects of our logo. This term, we will begin with slowly introducing the logo, our story and introduce you all to Ray (the stingray!). Ray becomes a fun mascot who speaks for all of us and will be used for celebrations and rewards i.e. stickers, and badges.



Our original school logo was designed by Barbara Smith in 1989 and served the purpose of connecting the school with its location. To give respect to people past and present, we needed to create a strong logo that everyone in Plimmerton sees themselves in, and connects us to the land and community and the rich history of our area. It is the visual identity and symbolic representation of our shared values, goals, and aspirations.

The three key themes are; Harakeke, the sea and Mana Island, all enclosed together by the circle. We look forward to opportunities to share more about them with you.

2024 School Donation / Whānau Contribution

Each year, the donations received by our school whānau make a huge difference in what we can offer our students/ākonga. The school donation is voluntary, so thank you again to those who contributed last year, we are very grateful for your continued support.

Schools' operational needs are primarily funded by the Ministry of Education but that only covers the very basics such as teacher salaries, property maintenance and administrative resources. Plimmerton School's curriculum budget is prepared based on providing the best possible education outcomes for our ākonga.

The reality for all schools is that we cannot do this without your help.

Each year your donation/whānau contribution is spent on curriculum resources such as art equipment, physical education gear, playground maintenance, additional reading and maths books, Learning Assistants and digital equipment, all of which are used in the day-to-day education of your tamariki. The whānau contribution is an essential part of ensuring that we resource our school adequately.

2024 Whānau Contributions

Our Board of Trustees has not increased the level of the contribution requested for each student for several years. This year, our budget set a target of \$25,000 to be raised through whānau contributions to support the school's fundraising for a replacement sunshade for the much loved junior sand-pit and two new vibrant all-seasons playground areas outside the school pool, to replace the grass that becomes unusable during the winter months.

This year we will be loading the whānau contribution onto Hero accounts to provide you with the convenience of paying off the amount throughout the year, via the various payment methods listed below.

The whānau contribution is voluntary, any remaining unpaid portion in your Hero account at the end of Term 3, 27th September 2024, will be recorded as 'no payment provided' and will be removed from your account.

At any stage up until the 27th September 2024 you can send an email to the school office to request that the whānau contribution in your Hero account be removed in part/or in full.

Once payment has been made a donation receipt can be downloaded directly from your Hero account. You are able to claim 33.33 cents for every dollar donated, for more information please visit the IRD website.

Whānau Contribution Payment Options

The contribution amount, as it relates to the number of children you have at school, will be added to your eldest child's account. Payments, in part or in full, will be applied to your Hero account as they are received so you can keep track of the contributions you have made.


Registrations are open now at www.tryathlon.co.nz and remain open on the day of the event or until sold out.


Orders from Issue 1 of Scholastic Book Club were delivered to classrooms at the end of last week. Please see Sarah if there are any problems with your order.

Strategic Planning Consultation Letter

Kia ora e te whānau,

The Board is pleased to have completed our mahi on the Strategic Plan for 2024 and 2025.

This letter is to share the insights received from the consultation process. We would like to thank our community for the feedback received throughout the process. The consultation process played a critical role in developing the plan and ensured that the voices of the community are heard and integrated.

Consultation Structure

Our consultation involved several stages:

- **1. Historical Review:** We undertook a review of historical consultations and documentation to understand the context of the previous Strategic Plan.
- 2. Initial Survey: We launched an initial survey to understand what our whanau wanted to see in our tamariki and how they wanted our kura to shape our ākonga as they progressed through their time at our kura. This shaped the initial draft of the Strategic Plan.
- **3. Presentation of the Draft Plan:** We then sought feedback on a draft of our Strategic Plan, which allowed us to gauge initial reactions and gather specific suggestions.
- **4. Open Evening Discussions:** We hosted an open evening to discuss the Plan in a more informal and interactive setting.
- **5. One-on-One Hui:** We invited everyone who reached out or made written submissions to attend one-on-one discussions, ensuring individual concerns and ideas were addressed.
- **6. Consultation with Tangata Whenua:** To continue building our relationship with Tangata Whenua, specific hui were held with whanau from Hongoeka.

Consultation Feedback

The feedback received contained a wide range of perspectives and topics.

1. Survey Feedback:

- Many responses wanted the kura to focus on the core curriculum, with suggestions for smaller classes and more support for neurodiversity and gifted learners.
- The development of skills like confidence, critical thinking, and capability in core areas in our tamariki were emphasised.
- Concerns were raised about bullying, the need for less technology, and a desire for more Te Reo and incorporation of Te Ao Māori in school life.

2. Draft Plan Feedback:

- In-person feedback was predominantly positive.
- Concerns were raised about the 'REAL' proposal, with suggestions that they might make children feel negatively about themselves if not aligned with them. The acronym itself was not well-received by some.
- There was significant concern about a 'de-emphasising' of Te Reo and the place of Te Tiriti in the school's values.
- Respondents desired more concrete and less abstract goals in the Strategic Plan, with a focus on educational infrastructure and business-as-usual activities.
- There were also suggestions for SMART goals, academic development based on performance data, and managing the needs of a diversifying student population.

Integration of the Feedback

In response to this feedback, we have made adjustments to our Strategic Plan, and have completed the Implementation Plan, which sets out how we will execute the Strategic Plan over the coming years. The adjustments to the Draft Plan include:

- Reevaluating the use of 'REAL' to ensure it fosters a sense of community and does not inadvertently lead to negative self-perception among students.
- Revising the strategic goals to be more concrete and measurable, emphasising educational infrastructure and clear, actionable initiatives.
- Ensuring our continued incorporation of Te Reo and adherence to Te Tiriti principles in our Kura.
- The Implementation Plan now incorporates specific outcomes for each goal, focusing on academic development and addressing the needs of a diversifying student population.

We also want to reassure our community that the existing school values are not being replaced with the introduction of 'REAL'. The values remain, with 'REAL' being the encapsulation of them.

Looking Forward:

We are grateful for the thoughtful and detailed feedback we received. It has been critical to shaping a strategic plan that is not only compliant with legislative requirements but also resonant with the aspirations and values of our community.
